One of the main responsibilities of park rangers is safety. Seemingly small tasks such as completing registration forms at park offices become crucial links should a search and rescue mission become necessary. Park rangers are always alert to what's going on around them including changing weather patterns, declining trail conditions and high wind gusts. Beyond their daily exchanges with visitors, rangers provide guided tours, place badges on Junior Rangers, enforce laws and provide emergency roadside service. They're often called upon to serve as conservationists, ecologists, environmentalists and even botanists. They work to protect natural resources from vandals who attempt to destroy park property, pollute lakes and rivers, harm wildlife and leave campfires unattended

At Washington's National Park Fund, we get to work with park staff throughout the year. Superintendents serve as



The National Park Service (NPS) has no dating site. If Rangers Lucy and Darby Robinson had relied on one they might not have met. After all, Lucy loves mountains; Darby loves water. Not a match.

However, both grew up as "Park Brats," kids of passionate, dedicated park employees. Although briefly sampling other careers, the NPS culture exerted its magnetic force. Two years ago both landed at Mount Rainier.

Darby describes Lucy as a "spreadsheet ranger." As Rainier's Acting Budget Officer, Lucy interfaces with field staff and management. Hovering like a bird over fledglings, she monitors expenditures, matching priorities and funding.

Alternatively, Darby serves as the maestro of Paradise. As its Lead Interpreter, he organizes meadow walks, snowshoe hikes, and programs on geology, flora and fauna, photography and astronomy. In 2018, Darby saw a need to engage children and families. Developing participatory programs at Paradise, he filled classes and revitalized the Junior Ranger Program boosting engagement to 12,000.

Without question, these two employees are a perfect match for each other and Mount Rainier.

The PLBs allow the park's dispatch office to track both staff and volunteers – including in areas with no radio coverage – while traveling in the backcountry in real time. They prove to be invaluable when rangers/volunteers rescue someone in need due to a fall, wildlife encounter, extreme weather event or other hazards.
