The Meadow Rover Volunteer Program continues to be Mount Rainier National Park's most popular volunteer activity. The more than 200 dedicated Meadow Rovers donate nearly 9,000 hours to make close to 200,000 public contacts annually. Meadow Rovers patrol the subalpine meadows above Paradise and Sunrise, educating visitors about the importance of staying on trails, keeping wildlife wild, and wilderness preparedness and safety.
